In the 8o's the Council of Europe was a pioneer institution in the protection of personal data, with the adoption of the 108 Convention for the protection of individuals with regard to automatic processing of personal data, and in the particular area of criminal investigations, with the approval of the Recommendation R(87)15 on regulating the use of personal data in the police sector.

Data protection in criminal matters has also received the attention of the European Union. The Schengen Convention and later Europol and Eurojust have established their own systems for processing and exchanging criminal information and introduced appropriate rules on data protection. The FD 2008/977/JAI on data protection in criminal matters and the FD 2009/315/JAI on criminal records will be applicable for the exchange of information between the EU Member States when investigating transnational criminal offences. In addition, domestic legislation includes certain particularities regarding the processing and exchanging of information in criminal matters.

Most of the jurists don't have neither a general view of the existing criminal data basis at European, transnational and domestic level nor the necessary knowledge of the principles, guarantees and rights on data protection in criminal matters.

The DPiCP Project aims to provide judges and prosecutors with the necessary training in this specific field. It includes also the elaboration of adequate training materials for judicial schools and judicial training centres on this issue.
